y Mor offshore development. Sparks flew after a photo mon-tage of the North Wales coast created by SOS, was published in the Pioneer earlier this year.

The image, which featured on the letters page depicted an unofficial impression of what the Llandudno promenade could look like if the proposed army of Blackpool Tower-sized wind farms were to be implemented.

Sustainable Energy Alliance (SEA) slammed the move and formally complained to independent body ASA which polices the rules

laid down in advertising codes.

An expert for the ASA said of the photo montage: "Because the turbines appeared too densely spread and too close to the shore, the photograph exaggerated the likely effect of the proposed wind farm on the horizon and was not an accurate representation of what the wind farm would look like

when built."
The ASA have also told SOS not to use a number of claims made in their leaflets unless they can pro-

vide viable evidence.

But SOS chairman John
Lawson-Reay has hit back, and in a letter to the authority said that the group will 'ignore' their advice.

"The reality is that the ASA have no powers whatsoever to enforce their conclusions and we will congroup tinue to publish any material that

we consider to be fair and accu-

He added: "We are bemused as to the 'expert's' confusion regarding the number of turbines depicted and that they are too crowded. The image showed only 77 turbines when in fact there are likely to be over 290."

or the cards, also told how the group disagreed with the ASA over their leaflet and rejected claims that

SOS are 'marketers.'
He said: "We have no goods or services to sell, we are only concerned with alerting the public to what might happen to our environment.

But in a press release, SEA coordinator Jonathan Lincoln said: "We are obviously delighted by the conclusions reached by the ASA

council.
"By upholding the complaints against SOS, the ASA have underlined the importance of substantiated, factual information being made available about important projects such as Gwynt y Mor."
